



The luxury liner S. S. President Coolidge was built by the **Dollar Steamship** Company in 1931. She was launched, christened by the late President Coolidge's wife, Mrs. Grace Coolidge. She was the largest passenger ship constructed in America.



Built by Newport News Shipbuilding Drydock Company in Newport News, Virginia, the Coolidge was 654 feet 3 inches long (a waterline of 615 feet) and had a gross (displacement) of 21,936 tons.



Vanuatu is an archipelago of 82 islands (65 inhabited) situated southeast of the Solomon Islands, west of Fiji, and northeast of New Caledonia.

The islands cover 810 miles from north to south and are volcanic in origin with active volcanoes on land and undersea in the vicinity. Mount Tabwemasana on the island of Espiritu Santo is the highest point in Vanuatu at 6,165 feet. Tropical forest covers most of the islands though there is a relatively small number of flora and fauna species.

A HERO'S RETURN HOME

Captain Elwood J. Euart 1914 - 1942

More than 70 years after his heroic death, Captain Elwood J. Euart, a Pawtucket R.I. native and member of the 103d Field Artillery Battalion, was received by the Rhode Island National Guard Funeral Honors team at T.F. Green Airport, in Warwick, R.I. for a dignified transfer of his remains from the Department of Defense into his family's care on Saturday, Aug. 27, 2016.

A memorial ceremony honoring the life and sacrifice of Eaurt Island medal, for his heroic

was held on Tuesday, Aug. 30, 2016, at the Keefe Funeral Home in Lincoln, R.I. During the ceremony, Brigadier General Christopher Callahan, the Adjutant General, posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart Medals to the Euart family. Rhode Island Governor Gina Raimondo also presented the Rhode Island Cross to the family, the highest ranking Rhode

Artillery Battalion served as an Honor Guard throughout the ceremony maintaining a constant vigil until Capt. Euart's remains could be laid to rest for the final time. On Oct. 26, 1942, in the South Pacific, when the USS President Coolidge, carrying 5,440 men bound for the island of Espiritu Santo struck two friendly mines in the mouth of the channel, Captain Henry Nelson, the ship's commander, ordered the ship be beached in order to safely evacuate the men. Nearly all the ship's compliment, including Capt. Euart, made it safely ashore. But when

Euart remained aboard the badly listing ship, rescuing trapped service members below decks. Euart was credited for saving several service members that day. As the time passed, the ship slipped off the coral reef and settled in deeper water and eventually sank, trapping Capt. Euart, where he remained for more than 70 years undisturbed in Espiritu Santo's harbor Island, in the class of 1939. until 2013. In that year, a team of civilian recreational divers happened upon his remains.

After positively identifying the remains with DNA testing, the United States Army deployed a dive team from Hawaii to recover him in 2015, where he remained until funeral arrange-


"They say no one gets left behind, and the Army has done that. He's coming back to where he should be," said Vallee.

Captain Elwood J. Euart was a true son of Rhode Island. Born and raised in Pawtucket, R.I., he spent his youth in the Boy Scouts of America, earning the rank of Eagle Scout. He graduated from the Rhode Island State College, now known as the University of Rhode



A Description of the Slip-screen Created in Motor Paced Cycling







Monbors of Combat Team 172 are commended for the manner in which they 1. Members of Combet Team 1/2 are commended for the manner in which they not the first serious test of their discipline and training at the time of the sinking of the USAT PRESIDENT COLLINE, October 26, 1942. Without discipline of a superior kind the fest of abendoning ship by some 4,000 men in less than one hour could never have been accomplished. Coolness which force-tealled panic, trust in your leaders, consideration for the safety of others, sgility in acrambling down note and ropes, all combined to prevent a terrible disaster and weld together a Combat Team with nutual confidence between officers and men.



Telegram to Mr. and Mrs. Euart



172d Inf. A.P.O. 708 C/O Postmaser, San Francisco February 14, 1943

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Euart:

This is a letter which I have wanted to write to you for some time, but censorship would not permit. However, I finally obtained permission to carry out my wish.

As Chaplain of the 172d Inf. I was on the ship with your son when he gave his all that others might live. "Greater love than this hath no man - that he lay down his life for his friends!" This war has produced and will produce many men of heroic courage; but it is my opinion and, I am sure, that of every man on that ship, there will be no greater hero than Captain Euart.

When we were ordered to abandon the ship, your son was on deck and could have easily, and with honor, slid down the ropes to safety. But with that Courage and Love which is more than human, he went below to make certain that his boys were safely getting off the ship. I saw him there myself as I went down to the brig, to make sure that the boys there had been freed, and especially to check on a mental patient whom I had visited a half-hour before

The ship had listed to one side, and Capt. Euart had tied a rope about himself and fastened it to a railing so that he could rescue many boys who were unable to climb up the slippery, water-filled ship. And he did rescue them - all! Then just as he had expended nearly all of his strength in saving others and two of his fellow-officers were about to pull him to safety, the ship went down with all three. Somehow the others were shot up to the surface, but Capt. Euart's body is still tied to his post.

He died doing more than his duty. And his heroic sacrifice has instilled in us all a spirit which will help every man in our combat team to carry on for Captain Euart, and for our beloved Country! His body is still with the ship, but his immortal soul is with God. I am sure that you need not worry about his spiritual safety.

It seems to me that Capt. Buart had a premonition that he was soon going to Heaven. Although I had met him through Father Cullion back in camp, I came to know him very well on the ship. He had c charge of the enlisted men's dining-hall, and although it was being used from early morning until night, he managed to have it cleared for forty minutes each afternoon so I could offer Mass. He attended Mass and received Holy Communion every day, including the Feast of Christ The King, the day before his death.

Captain Buart completed his service to his Country, and today he is in God's Heavenly Army. And with what rank he must have been welcomed by Him who set us the example in giving His Life that others might live! Captain Buart followed that example even unto death!

Just a few days before his death, Capt. Ruart came to my statercom and asked for something to read. I gave him "The Song of Bernardette". The very morning that our ship went down - just an hour before it struck the mines - he came again as I was hearing confessions, to return the book. He had not quite finished it, and asked to borrow it again after we were ashore. I am sure that St. Bernardette told him the rest of the story that day in heaven!

I remember very vividly how he asked me for a copy of "A Soldier's Prayer", which we say after every Mass. It is a little prayer that I have asked every Catholic boy in our regiment to recite every day. Practically every boy had been "adopted" by some little child belonging to the "Children's Cruaade of Prayer"; and in return for the child's daily prayer the soldier was to recite this prayer daily. I had a few blanks on my desk for any other men who might wish to be "adopted" by the little children. (Nearly every Catholic member of the regiment had filled out such blanks.)


- 1. Yes, I am the one who found Elwood's remains.


